Page 3 CHAIR LUCE: Let the record reflect the vote was unanimous. 1 SATSOP - GRAYS HARBOR ENERGY PROJECT UPDATE 2 CHAIR LUCE: We have a project list that we're going to run 3 through at this point in time. 4 Stephen, did you have something? 5 MR. POSNER: No. 6 CHAIR LUCE: All right. The first project up is Grays 7 Harbor Energy Project. MR. ADAMS: Good afternoon, Chair, Members of the Council. I have some very large shoes to fill like you all know -can you hear me okay? -- so I'll do my best. 9 The month of July we ran zero. So because of that we have 10 no complaints or concerns from any of the neighbors. had no accidents, injuries. As far as the reports we did 11 the usual DMR monitoring reports. Our year-to-date 12 capacity factors is .3 percent. Some ongoing things: We have silencers on our relief 13 valves as part of our noise mitigation. That's still 14 ongoing. They will begin construction on the parts this Friday and begin installation of structural steel coming 15 Monday. Things are starting to move along. They're a little behind schedule with the move. 16 CHAIR LUCE: Great. 17 MR. ADAMS: That's all I've got if you have no questions. 18 CHAIR LUCE: Council questions? 19 Thank you very much. 20 MR. ADAMS: Thank You. 21 CHEHALIS GENERATION FACILITY 22 CHAIR LUCE: Chehalis. 23 MR. SANCHEZ: Good afternoon, Chair Luce and Members of the Council. My name is Patrick Sanchez, environmental analyst 24 reporting for Chehalis Power. 25 In the month of July there were no medical treatments or

1 recordable incidents. The plant achieved at the end of July 3,206 days without a lost-time accident.

2

- On the environment side our storm water, waste water, air
- 3 emissions monitoring results are in compliance with our permits for the month of July as reported in our quarterly
- 4 DMR standard emission reports.
- 5 On the carbon offset project we continue to work with the Chehalis River Basin and the Confederated Tribes of the
- 6 Chehalis Reservation on a project. We do have a meeting with a resource officer from the Chehalis Tribes meeting
- 7 with us next Wednesday. There was an article regarding the Climate Trust and the carbon offset project that was
- 8 released recently and a copy was attached for your review.
- 9 Plant Personnel: We currently have 19 positions with 18 positions filled. We have recently posted a position for
- 10 an electrician.
- Operations and Maintenance: The plant generated 57,895 megawatt hours with a capacity factor of 16.02 percent.
- 12 Year to date the plant's generated 119,634 megawatt hours at a capacity factor of 4.69 percent.

13

- On our generator step-up transfer that root cause
- 14 determination for the failure is still underway. We have some investigation work scheduled for this month. New
- transformer specification has been under review. Proposals were received, and it's my understanding that we are in the
- 16 process of purchasing that transformer and the plant is still going to have that transformer installed during the
- 17 first half of 2012.
- 18 The Chehalis Generation Facility's ramp rate/startup profile was revised to reflect the use of the new auxiliary
- 19 boiler during unit startups. The use of that boiler reduces the duration of the combustion turbine startup
- 20 events by approximately one hour, and it provides a net reduction of emissions during the combustion turbine
- 21 startup.
- 22 Regulatory Compliance: We submitted our DMRs and the air emissions reports. There were no exceedances to report,
- and there have been no Critical Infrastructure Protection Standard violations during the reporting period.

Page 6 WILD HORSE WIND POWER PROJECT UPDATE 1 CHAIR LUCE: Wild Horse, Jennifer. 2 MS. DIAZ: Yes, this is Jennifer Diaz with Puget Sound 3 Energy at the Wild Horse Wind Facility. Wind production for July generation totaled 64,600 megawatt hours for an 4 average capacity factor of 32 percent. The solar demonstration project generated 97,000 kilowatt hours. 5 There were no lost-time accidents or safety incidents to report in July. 6 7 Under compliance and environmental annual training was provided to all site staff on both the operations spill and storm water prevention plans. 8 A conference call was held with TAC members on August 9 to 9 review and recommend timing and protocol for the second year avian and bat monitoring in the expansion area. 10 TAC members unanimously recommended that approval of the So monitoring will begin in March of 2012 11 draft protocols. and continue through December of 2012 using the same 12 protocols as the first year monitoring. The turbines searched during the first year of monitoring will not be searched again with the exceptions of Turbines U1 and U2. 13 Based on direction from the TAC these two turbines will be searched again to identify if there's a significant 14 relationship between the avian and bat fatalities found at 15 turbines located near water sources; in this case, near Spike Spring. That's all I have. Are there any questions? 16 CHAIR LUCE: Thank you. 17 Questions? 18 No questions. Thank you very much. 19 COLUMBIA GENERATING STATION 20 CHAIR LUCE: Mr. Coody. 21 MR. COODY: Good afternoon, Chair Luce and Council Members. This is Don Coody with Energy Northwest reporting for 22 Columbia Generating Station. 23 Today is day 132 of Columbia's refueling outage. the July Council meeting I reported that the contractor for 24 the condenser project had provided a revised work schedule 25 showing the startup for Columbia in late August. July 20 the contractor provided us with yet another

- 1 baseline schedule indicating the completion of condenser vacuum pull on August 30 which would have equated to
- 2 startup of Columbia on September 9. However, based on the contractor's performance to date we believe a late
- 3 September time frame is more realistic for Columbia to be back on the grid. That's really all I have to report due
- 4 to the outage. Questions?
- 5 CHAIR LUCE: Thank you.
- 6 Council Member questions?
- 7 Mr. Coody, it's come to my attention that you may be retiring on August 31.

- MR. COODY: Yes, sir. Shannon Khounnala will be taking my
- 9 place reporting Columbia's status.
- 10 CHAIR LUCE: You spent 30 years in Energy Northwest?
- 11 MR. COODY: Yes.
- 12 CHAIR LUCE: Well, when I was in the service we used to have what they call a short-timer's calendar, and you got a
- 13 picture on it and you got to color in the different days that were left within which time you had to serve in the
- 14 military. So I assume that there is a short-timer's calendar somewhere on your desk.

15

- MR. COODY: Well, it's called time remaining and it states
- 16 the hours and minutes and seconds.
- 17 CHAIR LUCE: Right. I bet you're going to go to all the Cougar football games this fall. Right?

18

- MR. COODY: Come on. I'm a Husky believe it or not. I'm
- 19 kind of outnumbered over here.
- 20 MR. TAYER: It's still enjoyable to watch them lose.
- 21 CHAIR LUCE: That's a cheap shot even for a Husky fan.
- Well, whether it's a Cougar game or Husky we want to congratulate you on your retirement.

MR. COODY: Thank you. I appreciate that.

- CHAIR LUCE: You've provided an invaluable service and
- 25 cooperation with EFSEC over these many years. You have a sense of humor which is necessary in this job, and I know

- 1 that you will take that with you into your retirement. So come by and see us someday, and we won't talk about Energy
- 2 Northwest or refueling or anything like that. We will just have a cup of coffee and I'll tell you how the Cougars are
- 3 going to dispose of the Huskies this year.
- 4 MR. COODY: I'd be interested in hearing that.
- 5 CHAIR LUCE: All right.
- 6 MR. COODY: Thank you very much.
- 7 CHAIR LUCE: Thank you. We really appreciate your service.
- 8 MR. FRYHLING: Hey, Jim, I want stricken from the record that last comment about the Huskies. I don't think
- 9 that's -- I'm just kidding.
- 10 CHAIR LUCE: It's okay. I'm going to let you strike it from the record. The Cougars will take care of the
- 11 Huskies, and I think Shaun can attest to that.
- 12 BP CHERRY POINT
- 13 CHAIR LUCE: The next item on the agenda is Cherry Point, BP Cherry Point. Yesterday we had a public hearing to
- 14 receive comments on a recommended name change, and I believe that the opportunity for the comments continues
- until five o'clock today. We received an earlier letter on June 14 at which time Cherry Point Cogen, LLC, requested
- that the license be transferred to the affiliate BP West Coast Products, LLC.
  - So, Mr. La Spina, you were going to make a short
- 18 presentation, and then if the site certificate holder wishes to make a presentation that's entirely appropriate
- 19 as well. You want to make that?

- 20 MR. LA SPINA: Good afternoon, Chair Luce, I had a wonderful script and I had a draft resolution all ready for
- 21 you, but about an hour and a half ago we received a negative comment about the proposed SCA amendment and EFSEC
- staff has not had the time to consider the comment. So we recommend postponing your vote whether you want to have a
- 23 special meeting or wait a month or whatever.
- 24 CHAIR LUCE: Hang on a second. We can approve this subject to condition upon your review, my understanding is, of this
- 25 comment. If you find this comment to be substantive, then the condition would fall away.

POSNER: How we've done it in the past -- I'll just explain what we've done in the past -- is public comments 2 we've made them available for the Council to look at. particular comment brings up a number of points which we haven't had a chance to look at nor have the Council 4 Members. If we want to keep with how we've done things in the past, we would make the comment available to Council Members to review first before we propose a vote on the 5 resolution. However, we're open to considering other options if you wish to pursue, but that's how we've done it in the past for SCA amendment requests. 7 CHAIR LUCE: Well, Applicant, do you want to be heard on 8 this issue? 9 MS. McGAFFEY: Thank you, Chary Luce. Karen McGaffey representing the certificate holder. I haven't had a 10 chance to see the letter. I understood a letter came in from Cathy Cleveland who for those of you who have been 11 around in connection with this project before know that she's been participating. I frankly would be surprised if the nature of the comment goes to the issues that are 12 before the Council which is merely the transfer of the permit from one affiliate to another. I know she 13 historically has had other concerns about the project. quess on behalf of the certificate holder we would like to 14 see this resolve sooner rather than later, and if the Council wants to postpone it I guess we'd request perhaps 15 considering a special meeting rather than delaying it for 16 another month. CHAIR LUCE: I will concur with what staff's recommendation 17 is to postpone decision of this matter. I would ask that that comment be provided to the Council Members as soon as 18 possible, that is later this afternoon, and that we have a 19 special meeting sometime next week to resolve that issue assuming that staff can review that comment and that it 20 does not pose any substantive issues regarding the name change. 21 MR. POSNER: We can certainly do that. 22 CHAIR LUCE: Do Council Members have their calendars so we can figure out a time? I think we just need a quorum. 23 I'll be available.

Page 10 1 MR. FRYHLING: I can by phone, sure. 2 CHAIR LUCE: Okay. Anybody else? 3 MS. ADELSMAN: What day are we talking about, Jim? 4 CHAIR LUCE: We're picking a day sometime next week. We 5 need a quorum at least. Are you around next week, Hedia? 6 MS. ADELSMAN: I'm off on Monday and I should be around the rest of the week. 7 CHAIR LUCE: That gets three of us. Andy, how about you? 9 MR. HAYES: I don't have my calendar in front of me. think any day but Monday. Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday I 10 think works for me. 11 CHAIR LUCE: All right. So let's set a special meeting for Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday. In the meantime get us 12 that comment letter, and if there are substantive issues there that go beyond or substantive issues that address the 13 name change we would like to know about it. If they're not relevant to the name change, then we also will deal with 14 that in a different fashion. 15 MR. MOSS: Chair Luce, it's got to be Tuesday or Wednesday 16 for me. CHAIR LUCE: Tuesday or Wednesday it sounds like. You pick 17 them. Just get back to us. 18 Yes, Hedia. 19 MS. ADELSMAN: Wednesday works better for me than Tuesday. 20 CHAIR LUCE: All right. Well, we need a quorum for sure. 21 MS. ADELSMAN: Wednesday morning, Wednesday morning. 22 CHAIR LUCE: All right. That's fine. I can work with Wednesday morning. Everybody's head is going vertical. 23 we'll assume it's Wednesday morning unless we hear 24 otherwise, and we'll look for that comment letter later today. So we have to postpone this, but I think based on staff's recommendations and the Applicant's willingness to 25 do that we will just go ahead and do that.

Page 11 1 MS. McGAFFEY: Thank you. 2 WHISTLING RIDGE ENERGY PROJECT UPDATE 3 CHAIR LUCE: Whistling Ridge Energy Project. I have a 4 statement I want to read before we go any further on Whistling Ridge. I'm not going to take any comments or answer any questions, and I'm going to read it because I want to get it right. 6 The Council apologizes profusely again for the fact that the Final Environmental Impact Statement was not available at our August 3 meeting. It was beyond our control. was frustrating for us, very frustrating, and for those of you who took the time to attend that meeting it was a different meeting than what you thought you were going to go to. It was a different meeting than we thought we were going to go to, but some things are not within your 10 control. 11 That having been said, the Final Environmental Impact 12 Statement is now signed. It has been provided to the Council Members and it is publicly available. The Council has reached its decision on issues in the adjudicative 13 proceeding and a draft order has been circulated to the 14 members. Our current schedule going forward is as follows: During 15 the next 15 days Council Members will review the Final Environmental Impact Statement and individually contact 16 staff with any questions or comments. Council Members will not discuss the Final Environmental Impact Statement among 17 themselves. They are expected to state individually to staff their assessment of whether and how the adjudication 18 order and the FEIS should be considered in support of a recommendation to the Governor. 19 In late September or early October the Council will meet in 20 Stevenson, Washington. At that time the Council will conduct a workshop in public to discuss the administrative 21 order, that is the draft administrative order, the Final 22 Environmental Impact Statement, and if warranted a draft recommendation order, if warranted a draft recommendation order and/or a draft site certificate agreement. 23 The Council will not receive public comment or entertain 24 questions during this workshop. The Council will conclude 25 its workshop with a sense of the Council on the questions of whether the Council's draft order resolving issues in

- the adjudicative proceeding which was circulated to the Council Members last week is ready for signature and
- 2 service.
- 3 Secondly, whether the Council Members having considered the results in the adjudicative proceeding to which they have
- 4 agreed by that time, not yet in the draft AO in closed deliberative sessions, and that the Final Environmental
- 5 Impact Statement which they have individually reviewed, whether they are prepared to make a recommendation to the
- 6 Governor, and, if appropriate, approve an SCA for transmittal to the Governor.

7

- The Council will then take a recess during which time
- 8 members will individually review a draft recommendation prepared by staff based on staff's interaction with
- 9 individual members vis-à-vis each member's consideration, individual consideration of the FEIS and staff's knowledge
- of the decisions to which the Council Members have agreed on the issues in the adjudicative proceeding. The
- 11 recommendation may include a Draft SCA as an attachment.
- 12 The Council will then reconvene in public at a time to be announced that same day after the recess, engage in further
- discussions, if any, as it deems appropriate. The Chairman will entertain a motion as is appropriate in light of the
- 14 day's proceedings, and, if seconded, a roll call vote will be taken. Following the roll call vote the Chairman will
- describe the process and time frames for going forward. The Council will forward its recommendation to the Governor
- 16 at the earliest opportunity.
- 17 The Governor will then have 60 days after receipt to consider the Council's recommendation. As we know, she may
- 18 approve, reject, or remand to the Council such direction as she may provide. That is the public statement the Council
- 19 wishes to make with respect to Whistling Ridge today.
- 20 Staff?
- 21 MR. POSNER: Just a couple items on the EIS. It was issued Friday the 12th, it is posted on our website, and we do
- 22 have copies available, CD copies available. There are some copies here in this room if people would like to take them
- 23 with them. That's all I have.
- 24 CHAIR LUCE: Thank you.
- 25 Council Members, we'll look forward to a late September or very early October meeting in Stevenson.

Page 13 1 Manager, do you have an update? 2 MR. WRIGHT: I don't have anything for this meeting, 3 Mr. Chairman. CHAIR LUCE: Council Members, do you have anything you 4 would like to bring to the attention of the Council? 5 MS. ADELSMAN: No. 6 CHAIR LUCE: Hedia, did I hear your voice? 7 MS. ADELSMAN: Yes. I said no. 8 MR. SUTHERLAND: Mr. Chairman. 9 CHAIR LUCE: Yes, Doug. 10 MR. SUTHERLAND: I hope that as soon as the date is 11 determined that folks in the Stevenson County area and Skamania, the people in the city of Stevenson and in Skamania County are made aware of the intent purpose and 12 the agenda of that meeting so that those who are interested in that can attend. 13 CHAIR LUCE: That will definitely happen. 14 We will give public notice of the meeting and of the process. 15 MR. SUTHERLAND: I hope you do more than just a public 16 notice. 17 CHAIR LUCE: We're going to put out a notice to those who are on our list. 18 MR. SUTHERLAND: That's good. 19 CHAIR LUCE: Okay. That's called a public notice. could probably also publish -- I'm not sure how the process 20 works -- something in the paper. But those who have been involved in this project and have contributed 21 significantly, both supporting and opposing, will be given notice of this meeting, the time, the place, and process. 22 Good. 23 MR. SUTHERLAND: Thank you. 24 CHAIR LUCE: Anything else to come before the Council? 25 Hearing nothing we are adjourned.
