I would urge you to look at a fair evaluation of the project which weighs the economic impacts (jobs, taxes, reduction of foreign oil) with the environmental and safety aspects (\*reasonable\* potential for spills, fires, etc.).

I would urge you to keep the review applicable to the project, not to the issue of fossil fuels as a whole. Will this terminal completely remove our dependence on foreign oil? No. Is it the environmental apocalypse? No. My stance is that we are currently in a fossil fuel dependent economy. I would love it if we could transition to a completely renewable energy system (and we will when the inherent profit in it overcomes the fossil fuel economy); until then, let's remember that we need to gauge projects that relate to fossil fuels with the understanding that they are part of the backbone of our economy. After all, how many environmental lobbyists do you know that ride their horses instead of taking planes and cars?

I would also encourage you to look at creative ways of dealing with potential issues. One that we've faced in Skagit County is for emergency access when a train is blocking. I am a wheat farmer, my retirement fervor that I relish. Our family farm celebrates its 100<sup>th</sup> year of continuous operation in 2013. My father and grandfather broke the ground, sustained the soil and enjoyed the fruits of their labor with concern to pass this art. I can boast and you too should be proud that grain varieties today are marvels attributed to a century of diligent food research by 100s of WSU, UI, and OSU agric. professionals.

**Sugar donuts, pizza, pasta, beer**

I read at a site advertising this affair that the reason to be here is to protect farms. However I don't recall your offerings with our farm chores, purchasing fuel, doing maintenance, changing out a worn radiator, or controlling pests, and so raises my suspicion for whom, for what, or condition this protection implies. I don't recall anyone sharing my daily concern whether the thousands of hectares of field grains planted every September on farms will successfully endure the frigid conditions, a strong suggestion of the oncoming ice age.

Our farm is small. It produces a small amount on the scale of Washington farms but we shuttle 50-60 truckloads of wheat to market every year. I am always impressed by this bounty, aided year-by-year by the ever-growing natural fertilizer—CARBON DIOXIDE. We grow enough wheat and sometimes barley to supply Spokane County for about a week. That's a lot of flour for pizza, sugar donuts, pasta and barley for beer. Our farm equipment does not run on battery power. Our combines, trucks, and 8-wheel tractors require oil, grease, and diesel to operate huge engines. That is why all of you need to support this source of crude oil offered us to provide refined product to supply your beer, pizza and pasta habits. For, it is because of this NEED and WANT of transportation, that you require this supply.

**"Dirty oil"**

At another place a lady was complaining about the oil being dirty. The message was a bit puzzling but I'll try to clarify. What I know is oil is composed of C, H, O, and N and then traces of metals-nonmetals, Ni, V, S, etc. Their proportions are about the same as that of coal, though coal is from plant materials and oil is from micro-organisms or marine life-forms, not unlike us, then buried to great depths of formation and gifted to you by our high-technology. The only difference is that coal contains soil material. The marvel of the Bakken Shale from which the oil comes is an great example of how the recycle of life forms now provide for us to provide for our families that will be coming on those tank cars and then returned to Tesoro stations WHERE you fuel up.

I provide two illustrations. (FIGURES) The first pictures a rock, a meteorite, but specifically a carbonaceous chondrite meteorite. The 2<sup>nd</sup> one shows its elemental abundance. Chondrites are important because they represent *a life-giving extraordinaire* from the primordial mush assembled into our earth 4.5 billion years ago. Components in chondrites are O, S, C, Mg, Fe, and N. And in lesser amounts are Ca, Al, Na, Ni, P, and Mn. Sounds like a One-a-Day vitamin. Even more special, a chondrite contains the basic organic building blocks of all life on this earth, for your bodies and mine, from that primordial mush. Included here are water, aliphatic, aromatic, and polar HCs, over 70 amino acids, carboxylic acids, sulphonic and phosphonic acids, carbonyls, alcohols, and amides. From these beginnings evolved primitive life forms on earth--that eventually took on human form—and represented in billion-year-old rocks right here in Washington.

All I can figure is that the dirty oil she talked about was her roommate who never bathes.

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
